"Bringing my boys to Seeach Sod is one part of their year's program in Israel that I wouldn't have them miss for the world," says Rabbi Isaacson, rosh yeshivah of Yeshivat Sha'arei Mevaseret Zion (Mevaseret). "It teaches them compassion, resilience, and ahavas Yisrael. I take the entire yeshivah body of 100-plus on a tour of Seeach Sod's main campus on Rechov Yirmiyahu in Jerusalem. We also have groups who visit on Chanukah and Purim, and some who go each week to entertain the younger Seeach Sod members."

Seth Maza of Highland Park, NJ, a shanah-bet *talmid* and talented musician, is one such volunteer. "That feeling of going in and seeing all those kids and how they're all cared for and loved is awesome," he says. "I remember the first time I went, I was a little afraid, unsure of what I'd see. But as soon as I walked in and saw

their smiles, my fears just melted away.

"Since that day, for five months my pals and I volunteered each Tuesday to sing and play for the kids. We had to stop because of the coronavirus.

"When they'd see us coming, they'd start bouncing and clapping, and those who were able to, retrieved their drums and banjos from the back of the room, wanting to join the band." Rina Wolovitz from Cleveland, Ohio, who toured Seeach Sod when visiting Israel on a NCSY program can't wait to share the experience with her seminary friends this year. "On the drive from the airport to our dorm, I saw the Seeach Sod sign, and I said to my friends, 'Oh, look! Seeach Sod! I can't wait to go there again!' Making those kids and precious little babies so happy and seeing them so excited made *me* happy — like a real happiness, the one that comes from giving to others."
